Red Cross Funds Allotted to Cape

Rehabilitation for Storm Area Planned.

The Red Cross today established a rehabilitation office at 19 North Middle street, telephone 71, where applications from stricken families who need rehabilitation assistance are being received.

Requests for emergency care are being taken at the main Red Cross headquarters in the Chamber of Commerce Building.

Emergency relief is classified as that meeting immediate needs of sufferers, including medical attention, food, clothing and temporary shelter.

Rehabilitation relief is that in the long range view. It is for the purpose of re-establishing in homes those who suffered complete or partial loss of their dwellings.

To Give Money.

This permanent relief is in the form of an outright gift from the national Red Cross. It goes to those families affected by the disaster who are unable themselves to meet their needs.

A \$500,000 relief fund has been set aside by national headquarters to care for the rehabilitation program in Missouri, Kansas and Illinois. Officials here explained that this will be made available.

The rehabilitation program was mapped Sunday afternoon at a meeting of the County Court, City Council and Red Cross officials. Following is the statement issued to explain the relief program:

The American Red Cross has been officially designated as the rehabilitation agency of the city and county.

An official Rehabilitation Office is established at 19 North Middle street in Cape Girardeau—Telephone No. 71—and applications for assistance will be received. Emergency applications are now being received at the Red Cross office.

Forrestal Leaps to Death From Hospital

Washington, May 23.—(AP)—A naval board of inquiry was ordered today to inquire into the suicide of James Forrestal but his friends among the nation's great wrote their own verdict: He died because he worked so hard for his country.

Forrestal, 57-year-old, cabinet member under Presidents Roosevelt and Truman, ended his own life early Sunday by leaping from the 16th floor of the Navy's towering hospital in Bethesda, Md. He left as his farewell only an ancient Greek poem of despair and death.

He was the first secretary of defense—a wearing job that he gave up as a sick man in March. Before that, he had been secretary of the mightiest Navy the world has ever seen, and before that he had served as an assistant to Franklin D. Roosevelt in the White House.

provide two general types of assistance—emergency relief, and rehabilitation aid.

Emergency Relief.

Emergency relief is now being carried on and is directed towards meeting the immediate needs of the sufferers—the needs of rescue, medical attention, food, clothing, and temporary shelter. Facilities are available for transportation and temporary storage of household goods. Temporary shelter is available at the Arena building. A first aid station is being maintained at 120 North Spanish, where the Cape County Medical Association is providing medical care between the hours of 1 and 3 p. m. daily. Other requests for assistance should be directed to the Red Cross Disaster Headquarters.

Rehabilitation Relief.

Rehabilitation relief is offered those families affected by the disaster who are unable through their own efforts to meet disaster-caused needs.

Permanent Relief and assistance may include maintenance, clothing, furniture and other household furnishings, building and repair of homes, medical and nursing care, farm supplies and equipment, occupational training, equipment, and supplies.

Urgent cases will be given priority—that is, widows, orphans, the ill, the aged, and emergency cases.

Basis for Assistance.

The disaster-caused need of a family, rather than its loss is the basis upon which assistance is given. A person who lost heavily in the disaster, but who is able to stand the hardship, will not be the subject of relief. The relief funds have been contributed by the American people, not to take the place of insurance and to replace losses, but to meet actual needs which the sufferers themselves cannot meet from their own resources—that is, their own cash, credit, insurance, and earnings. Needs not caused or aggravated by the disaster cannot be met from relief funds. The Red Cross will provide essentials only, and each case will be considered separately.

Procedure for Relief.

Requests for assistance will be handled through a local American Red Cross Advisory Committee, soon to be appointed from among the citizens of the county. Their recommendations to the disbursement agency of the American Red Cross national organization will be based their evaluation of the local situation.

Applications for assistance will be taken by Red Cross representatives at Agency Headquarters which have been established today at 19 North Middle street in Cape Girardeau. Information given Red Cross Workers will be kept confidential.

Cases will then be referred to a Red Cross case worker who investigates the facts and make their report direct to the local Advisory Board.

When the information is complete and the facts presented to the local Advisory Board, the area director will, if the case warrants relief, issue his Disbursing Order to the recipient who may take it to the local merchants for the goods listed upon the order. The Red Cross pays the bills direct. In the event construction is necessary, building experts are utilized for the purpose of ascertaining the amount of the loss, the recipient selects his own contractors who are asked to bid on the project; and the contract let directly by the Red Cross. The work is, of course, subject to inspection at the completion of the work.

We desire to emphasize that local trade is supported, and that the recipients of relief select the retailers, wholesalers and contractors employed.

We also desire to emphasize that relief granted are gifts of the people. The Red Cross does not make loans to disaster
