

Another Hurt In Blow Dies

Mrs. Rose Succumbs as Does Oak Ridge Man.

The list of dead from Saturday's tornado rose to 22 today as Cape Girardeau, bouncing back from the initial shock of its mauling, moved into the second stage of recovery—the rebuilding of its demolished sections and the smooth functioning of all helping agencies.

Succumbing late Tuesday was Mrs. Roy Rose, 63, 1116 North Fountain street, who suffered a chest injury and had been in a critical condition since the tornado. Her husband was one of those instantly killed in the storm. Both Mr. and Mrs. Rose were blown some distance down the street.

The total of dead in the county became 23 with the passing at 8 a. m. today of Casimir Wilson, 61, Negro of Oak Ridge, who was injured Saturday when the same or another tornado demolished his dwelling.

Rebuilding Stepped Up.

Construction in the torn up areas, which began in a small way Sunday and increased some Monday, assumed major proportions Tuesday after rain during the morning had all but halted the work. In one instance a house which was completely blown away had the studding erected Tuesday, the first sign of building from the ground up to be seen.

But elsewhere roofs were being patched or constructed, debris was being removed, streets and roads were cleared and, in the cases where minor damage had been sustained, repairs to houses were being made.

Twenty insurance adjusters, 17 of whom were called here from elsewhere, took to the storm areas this afternoon to inspect damage to insured property. Adjusters and insuring companies are making every effort to expedite the settling of claims, and J. C. R. Feller, manager of the Cape Girardeau branch of the Western Adjustment and Inspection Co., said some of the insured will receive checks early next week.

The Red Cross rehabilitation center at 19 North Middle street began to expedite its disaster relief. Residents who need assistance in rebuilding their dwellings called for interviews and the list is expected to grow daily.

Clothing for the victims poured into the center, but officials issued a plea today that no additional used gar-
